Does this appear to be a phishing email and why?

- The email asks for **full name, email, department, phone number, year of study** — information that can be used for identity theft or further scams.

6. Spoofed credibility

- The sender signs off as from the “Department of [REDACTED], University of Maine System,” but there is no legitimate link or verification.

✓ **Verdict:** This is **not legitimate** and should be reported as a **phishing / job scam**.
